Dear Ms. Smith:

I am writing you today in support of the above-referenced Trade Adjustment Assistance Petition (TAA), submitted by Agrium U.S. Inc., which operates a nitrogen facility in Nikiski, Alaska on the Kenai Peninsula. The nitrogen plant is scheduled to shut down effective November 1, 2005, causing the loss of over 200 highly skilled, good paying jobs. Additionally, their contractors and vendors will also be impacted. Ultimately, over 500 workers and their families living on the Kenai Peninsula could be affected by this plant closure.

I urge the immediate approval of the Trade Adjustment Assistance Petition submitted by Agrium, which appears to be increasing production at plants located outside the United States in their effort to seek more economical supplies of natural gas, a product necessary to produce nitrogen fertilizer. Please also consider that the United States is increasing imports of nitrogen fertilizers. It is my understanding that these fit the criteria needed to approve a Trade Adjustment Assistance Petition.

The ability for Agrium's workers to have access to TAA benefits is vital. The Health Care Tax Credit benefit, job re-training, job search support, relocation, Trade Readjustment Allowances, and the Alternative Trade Adjustment Assistance program will assist these workers in a smooth transition into new employment.

I urge your approval of this important petition for Trade Adjustment Assistance by Agrium U.S. Inc. on behalf of the citizens of the City of Soldotna and the Kenai Peninsula Borough who will be affected by this closure.
